supported by Lancashire Life, The Villa, Wrea Green, Lancashire Association of Local Councils, several Lancashire County Councillors

The majority of private properties in the village were well maintained with well tended gardens. Commercial properties were also in good order. The Saracen's Head was considered to be one of the best public houses visited by the judges, with well kept grounds & a lovely floral display. St. Cuthbert's Church was in good condition with a tidy graveyard & neatly

mown grass. St. Cuthbert's School was also in good order. The War Memorial was well cared for & made an attractive focal point in the centre of the village.

Both East Cranton Farm & Manor House Farm were clean & tidy & a credit to their owners. Manor House Farm had a beautifully maintained garden. The nature reserve (Bishops Walk) was considered to be a great asset to the village, although there was a comment that it was very overgrown but possibly intended to be that way? It was suggested that wild flowers would enhance the area.

The playing fields were litter free & the equipment in good condition. The judges were impressed with Halsall & congratulate the residents on taking such pride in their village.

Finally, a BIG, BIG THANK YOU to everyone involved in the planning (and there were lots of PTFA meetings) and to the volunteers who helped out with parking, stalls and clearing away. An event such as this demands a tremendous amount of commitment from a great many people so as a school and a community, we should be very humble.

Bishop's Walk: Dogs

Bishop's Walk is a lovely, nature conservation area where people can sit and relax and chat or even have a picnic. It is also often used as a walk-through by people wishing to by-pass the busy main road. Unfortunately, quite a lot of dog mess is being left on and around the paths and this is being brought into school on children's shoes. If you have been to church recently you will probably have noticed that there are not many young adults in church.

Currently under 10% of the people who go to church are between the ages of 16-30 and this is predicted to fall to under 3% by 2040. Red Church is a new initiative to try and connect young adults with church.

Red Church began when a group of Church of England churches from the Ormskirk deanery decided to try and do something about the falling numbers of young adults going to churches in this area. At the beginning of 2013 Ben Dyer was employed by the deanery to create a church that would connect with young adults in a new and different way. Red church is the result and we had our official launch night on 1st October. Our aim is to be a welcoming and honest group of people, who try to live life following Jesus and helping each other along the way.

The Rector Writes:-

Beginnings can seem insignificant but where they lead can be of enormous importance. So it is with Christmas. It is not that it leads us into the New Year; rather, it seems so unlikely a place to start. If you or I were trying to solve the massive problems that plague the world, we'd want to send in a proven troubleshooter who would "sort people out."

But Christmas isn't like that because God isn't like that. He specialises in the unexpected. He uses the fragile and the vulnerable. And so God takes a tiny baby of uncertain parentage in an obscure part of the Roman Empire and through this child offers us all new hope and a new beginning.

It's always been easy not to notice Him. How large loom all the practical preparations for Christmas. It becomes a children's festival, a family time. And the One who began it all gets left unnoticed or regarded as something left over from the past. And so society's problems and even those of our own hearts and lives remain.

But the possibility of new beginnings remains. It's just that we need to be quiet, to stoop down low enough and look hard enough to notice God's surprise – and pay attention to Him. Give yourselves space and silence in prayer to seek Him.

How silently, how silently the wondrous gift is given.

Silence is the gateway to our souls. And our souls are the gateway to God.



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A Community Cafe/Shop for Halsall – Survey

For most villages a shop is a vital lifeline and for some people, especially those without transport, it is an important connection with the world beyond their front door. It is a meeting place, communication centre and an important lynchpin of village life. Much of the appeal of our village rests on its sense of community. It is the reason many people have moved here and remain here. A community shop is owned by the local community and run by local community volunteers and puts its profits back into the shop/cafe and the local community. The aim of our shop/cafe will be to support local producers, farmers and other business.

This kind of venture has been successfully achieved in other villages. There are currently over 300 community owned shops/cafe in England, Scotland and Wales and most of these have been set up with the support of the charity Plunkett Foundation (www.plunkett.co.uk). Will our village be the next one?

We need to know your views on what might be provided and what would receive your support. This survey is being delivered to every house within the Halsall Parish. Please be as honest and realistic as possible in your answers. Your response will be treated in confidence. It is entirely anonymous, unless you wish to add your name at the end.

The questionnaire will be collected – Thursday 12th Dec during the day, please leave somewhere it can be collected easily (e.g with a neighbour if you think you will be busy).

The results of this survey will be published and presented to a public meeting when the proposal can be discussed further. We will notify you of a meeting via the Parish magazine and the notice board sited at the Halsall Memorial playing fields as well as St Aiden's Hall.

We would also like to hear from you if you feel you could help in any way with the running of the shop. There will be a wide range of tasks to be done from the initial setting up of the project to managing the enterprise and being involved in the day to day practical operation.

January at-a-glance

Whether it snows or not, the stars of the January landscape are tree trunks, coloured stems and twiggy shapes. There is always something to do in the garden in January. So, wrap up warm and happy winter gardening!

General Garden Tasks.

Carry out repair jobs

Treat and repaint fences, sheds and garden furniture

Claen, oil and sharpen the metal blades of garden tools

Maintain mowers and other machinery

Deal with slippery paths.

Reorganize your storage space – make room for tools and gardening gear.

Sort out the Christmas tree!

Clear up around the garden

Prepare new beds and borders if weather and conditions allow

Brush any snow of the greenhouse roof

Prune Wisteria

Order seeds

Protect plants and containers from frost

Deadhead pansies

Prune standard apple and pear trees

Protect fruit cages from snowfall

The Parish Councillors did not back a vote asking that Cllr. Doreen Stephenson should resign her Parish and Borough Councillor seats. The Chairman responded to that request from a member of the public stating that it was up to Cllr. Stephenson to decide whether to resign or not but did agree that the request be recorded in the minutes.

The Chairman was acting correctly when he asked that no photographs be taken as no prior approval had been sought or given.

The Council are more than willing to accommodate the press at its meetings. All the Council asks is that common courtesy is shown and that it is asked in advance if they wish to take photographs so that this can be arranged in a structured manner to avoid disrupting the meeting.

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
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JUDGES' REPORT - SHIRDLEY HILL

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A Lantern of Light

Roy Strong in his book on parish churches refers to the medieval parish church as a lantern of light. The perpendicular style of construction opened vast windows of light into the church. Where once they had been cramped dark places, they now resembled the Cathedrals with great expanses of window and fine stonework. The chancel at St Cuthbert's



displays these very features. Four huge gothic windows enable, first the rising sun in the east and then on the south side the streams of morning sunlight to enter the altar space and choir. This is never more resplendent than in the winter months when the Sun is low and the sunlight reflects the stained glass on the north wall. A clerestory window was added later and high up on the nave. This lets further daylight in and allowed the rood loft to be lit during passion plays.

While these windows decorated in stain glass let light in, they also had the reverse effect, in the dark part of the year and particularly at Christmas enabling the light from within the church to pierce the darkness of a wintery eve.

Presently our church is floodlit and has all manner of electric light inside from spotlights

to neon and Led lighting. However one need only go back to the 1950's, when street lighting was new to Halsall and primitive by today's standards, to imagine the darkness surrounding our beautiful church. Yet our church had stood for 600 years before electricity or gas lighting. Then it would have been lit by candles and perhaps at Christmas, by fiery torches. The church with its warm glow and colour would have stood out like a blazing lantern against skies filled with stars crisp and clean on a frosty night unpolluted with artificial light. Consider how the village would have worked together to make this special place even more special at Christmas. Today we have a few volunteers who take pride in sweeping and polishing to maintain the church's comfortable and clean standard. Others devote time to decorate, prepare flowers, Christmas trees and ensure music, light, warmth and a smell of fresh polish. Last Christmas the annual carol event in the churchyard was followed by a candlelight gathering in the Nave. This was the first time for many years that the Nave had been lit by burning flame and was the brainwave of Dave Sephton the churchwarden.

In medieval times preparing the church for Christmastide would have involved the entire village. The floor would have been relaid with fresh straw, beeswax would have replaced the smelly tallow of candles. Holly from the churchyard was used to decorate the walls and torches of pitch and oil hung from iron brackets. Church ales were brewed beforehand. In all a very jolly celebration was inclusive of the whole village, to celebrate the birth of a unique baby in Palestine many years ago. And when those medieval worshippers left for home on that sacred night, they would have met total darkness outside. If they were lucky the moon might light their way. Otherwise after a few moments of adjusting retinas to the dark, the marvellous and miraculous sight of thousands of stars and nebulae would only confirm in their eyes and hearts, the wonder and glory of God's creation and power.



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
