The Reader Writes...

As I write this, I am what's known as a "General Synod widower". Two or three times a year, along with many others, Debra, my wife, abandons any semblance of domestic normality to head to London or York for a few days at a time.

I am very keen that the Church of England is conscientiously and well governed so I am pleased that 483 people give their time, expertise and work out their faith in this way (just not me!). Having had little to do with General Synod until Debra was elected ten years ago, I have come to appreciate just what they do. So in order to help understand the role and functions of General Synod, I lifted this from the Internet:

The General Synod is the national assembly of the Church of England. It came into being in 1970 under the Synodical Government Measure 1969, replacing an earlier body known as the Church Assembly. The General Synod considers and approves legislation affecting the whole of the Church of England, formulates new forms of worship, debates matters of national and international importance, and approves the annual budget for the work of the Church at national level.

Synod is made up of three "houses"; the House of Bishops (all Diocesan and a few Suffragan or Assistant Bishops are members); the House of Clergy (consisting largely of priests elected by their peers); and the House of Laity (made up of lay people from every Church of England Diocese who are mostly elected by members of Deanery Synods).

The Synod's business falls into a number of categories, each governed by its Standing Orders:

- Legislative Business: Synod approves Measures (which, on receiving the Royal Assent, have the force and effect of Acts of Parliament), Canons and subordinate legislation (orders, regulations and instruments). Where legislation is not needed it makes provision by Acts of Synod, regulations and other instruments.
- Liturgical Business: Synod also authorises forms of service for use in the Church of England.
- Scrutiny: Synod receives annual reports from the Archbishops' Council and its Audit Committee. At each group of sessions members can ask Questions of the central Church bodies.
- Financial Business: Synod approves the budget of the Archbishops' Council and the apportionment among the dioceses of the sums to be paid by the dioceses to the Archbishops' Council.

Other Business: The Synod's final function under its Constitution is 'to consider and express their opinion on any other matters of religious or public interest.' Some motions are moved on behalf of central Church bodies, some are sent to the General Synod by diocesan synods (Diocesan Synod Motions – or DSMs) and some are moved by individual members of the Synod with the support of other members (Private Members' Motions – or PMMs).

So what do they actually do? Is it just another talking shop?

Well, going by the PILES of papers that come through the letterbox some weeks before each Synod, they do have a lot to talk about! This February's business included the following:

- An update on Living in Love and Faith (LLF) a major piece of work on the Church's theology, liturgy and pastoral approach to issues of human sexuality.
- Climate Emergency & Carbon Reduction Targets General Synod committed all parts of the Church of England (including parishes and dioceses) to work to achieve year on year reductions in emissions to achieve net ZERO emissions by 2030.
- Safeguarding Response to recommendations in the Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse (IICSA).
- Children & Youth Ministry The picture indicates (using national statistics)
 that if the present rate of decline continues, in less than 10 years we will
 have NO under-16s in our churches. Central church funding is being made
 available for initiatives and research is being funded to look at issues
 surrounding this.
- Private Member's Motion Synod agreed to establish a taskforce to form plans at national, diocesan and parish levels to use resources to tackle issues relating to and end "pauper's funerals" (where possible) and to work with others to deliver a more compassionate send off for loved ones at an affordable price.
- Private Member's Motion Windrush Synod made a commitment to end racism within the Church; the Archbishop of Canterbury acknowledged that the Church of England is institutionally racist and he apologised for its racist history.

Clergy well-being and a Revising Draft Cathedral Measure (which revises the way in which Cathedrals are governed) were also dealt with.

So, all in all, much more than a talking shop. Important issues affecting both our Church and our society have been discussed and Synod has committed the Church to some positive action.

Whilst Debra has been dealing with issues of national church governance, I have been re-sealing our bathroom shower!

Please remember the work of General Synod (and my reluctant attempts at DIY) in your prayers.

Bible Study – Matthew's Gospel



Dear Friends,

Later in this magazine you will find the traditional invitation of the church, used on Ash Wednesday to encourage Christian believers everywhere to observe a period of devotion in preparation for the celebration of Easter. Traditional activities include (as you might imagine) Prayer, Fasting, and 'meditating on God's holy Word'. We might hear the bible read week by weak and be familiar with some of its passages but when was the last time that you had a good look though it, or thought about it for any length of time? Lent is the ideal time to pick up the dusty old tome and having a look inside.

This year our Lectionary (the system we use for deciding what readings to use on a Sunday) is working its way through Matthew's Gospel. Matthew's Gospel was written towards the end of the first century (perhaps 85 AD) shortly after the Roman destruction of the temple in Jerusalem. It is thought to have been written by a member of the Jewish / early Christian community with the intention of helping that community rebuild. It was written for a community reeling in shock as the great symbol of their faith (the temple), that they revered, paid taxes for and worshipped in had been destroyed by the Romans. The Gospel contains passages that aim to help them make sense of the situation they found themselves in and help build up a church where proper righteousness was taught and lived. Obedience to the Law was not to be driven by an obsession with external command but would develop as a natural response to the realization that God had brought the reality of divine presence amongst us in Jesus, disposing the heart of the Christian disciple towards God.

Matthew's Gospel was intended to pull people together and on occasion speak to their behaviour (18:21). Interested in finding out more? I can thoroughly recommend 'Lent for Everyone Matthew Year A' by my former tutor Tom Wright. How about we get together in Lent and see if we can't go a bit deeper? From the Diocese Lent Fasting challenge for 2020 #Rule of Life

Last year we encouraged people to carry out a lent fast as part of their spiritual disciplines and this year we looking at this again with a two week challenge to help us think around why and how we should fast. This week we will look at the tradition of fasting and set a challenge to help you explore what fasting means to you. Next week we will look at some practical steps to take when it comes to observing a fast this lent.

Fasting is rooted in the traditions of our faith - many examples are found in the Old and New Testaments and across the generations. Recent years however have seen a decline in this discipline. There are many reasons for this - health and lifestyle and our obsession with food and cooking are an obvious few and then there's the Fast gap in Christian teaching.

So, what is a fast?

A fast is abstaining from something in order to discipline the mind, body and soul to focus upon God. By giving something up fasting carves out the space for God's creativity. It is a mark of our humbling ourselves before God and seeking him with our whole heart. Fasting is always accompanied by prayer. Fasting can be abstaining from anything that occupies too big a space in our life. For example, shopping, social media, car travel, TV.

The space or time that is created by our fast is then given over to God in prayer, Bible reading and social action.

Throughout the Old and New Testament the people of God fasted and prayed. (Joel 2.12, 2 Sam 1:2, Neh 1.4, Acts 13.2, Acts 13:3-4, Acts 14:23).

Fasting is a solid biblical and ancient tradition of religious people and we encourage you to take part in whatever way you can.

NEWS FROM YOUR PARISH COUNCIL

2020/21 HALSALL PARISH PRECEPT

The Parish Council are pleased to report that the 2020/21 precept to be raised from Council Tax £16,399 with a taxbase of 835.71 gives a Band D equivalent Tax Level of £19.62 a decrease of 8.65% on the previous year.

PROJECTS

The Council are in the process of installing a sewage treatment plant at the Memorial Hall in order to comply with new Environment Agency regulations.

This is being funded with The **Community Infrastructure Levy** (CIL) was introduced by West Lancashire Borough Council in 2015; the Levy imposes a charge on certain new developments, based on the size of the properties being built. This is designated to underwrite the cost of improving the infrastructure within the Borough necessitated by such development.

The Parish Council receives 15% of this Levy for developments carried out within its own Parish

PARKING ALONG SUMMERWOOD LANE

Cars parking either side of Summerwood Lane at school times and when funerals and weddings are taking place at St Cuthbert's are causing an obstruction and prevent large vehicles, including the emergency services from passing through.

Please use the Memorial Hall car park whenever possible.

PARKING ON NEW STREET NEAR TO THE JUNCTION WITH CARR MOSS LANE

This is creating a dangerous situation for cars trying to turn out of Carr Moss Lane because their line of sight is obstructed and we would ask that people refrain from parking so close to the junction before a serious accident occurs.

PARKING ALONG MOSS ROAD

Cars parking on pavements are causing problems along Moss Road. Can residents please park in their driveways if possible and leave enough room when parking on pavements to allow prams and wheelchairs to get through.

The War Memorial Hall and Playing Field - a brief history

When in 1949 Lady Lethbridge <u>sold</u> 5 acres of land to the Right Reverend Charles Claxton and others for £520 with the one proviso that it <u>"shall only be used as a playing field"</u>, little could she have known the complications, quarrels and conflicts that would ensue over the years. That same plot of land was conveyed in 1953 to the safekeeping of Halsall Parish Council as sole Trustee of a Registered Charity <u>with the same covenant on its use</u>.

The Charity as it was then structured had very limited powers and, it has to be said, little experience of the legal requirements inherent in being a charity. Despite the best endeavours of those closely involved, the constraints taken together with the interventions and influence of other community groups over the years led in the late 1990s to considerable problems, financial and otherwise, in managing the Trust.

The Charity Commission was approached and some of the main findings make interesting reading: -

- The Memorial Hall should never have been built the land was covenanted for use only as a 'playing field'.
- The Snooker Club building contravened the covenant. Moreover, it
 was a private members club and could not be considered as
 coming within a charitable context.
- The Scout Hut was not within the charitable context and in any case it was and is illegal for one charity to support another either directly or indirectly.
- The then Bar within the Hall was licensed as a Club Licence and therefore open to members only and in this format was deemed not compliant with charitable objectives.
- The then Management Committee composed of representatives from various organisations was deemed not the appropriate vehicle to manage the Trust.

Although in serious breach of the original covenant on several counts, the Charity Commission, not wanting to take radical action, e.g. demolish the Hall etc., required the Trustee, Halsall Parish Council, 'to regularise the position'. The Charity Commission recognised that a new Scheme (Constitution) was required giving Halsall Parish Council the means and the powers to manage the Trust effectively. In arriving at this conclusion the Commission wrote and underlined the following:

"The Councillors should ask themselves whether they are prepared to give up their valuable time on an ever increasing basis in order to run the Trust and accept the accountability inherent in doing so."

Fortunately for the village, the Councillors, two of whom are still active, Dave Corfield and Ray Brookfield, together with other Councillors elected since the revised Scheme came into being in December 2006, felt it was/is worth the effort. However, make no mistake, managing this valuable community asset, keeping it viable and within charity law takes effort, a lot of effort, by Councillors who, unlike their counterparts at Borough and County, are unpaid volunteers. In similar vein, without the help and dedication of Gary Southworth and the Halsall Cricket Club, the job of doing so would be that much more difficult.

In the face of considerable opposition - the police had to attend one public meeting to prevent a breach of the peace - the Trust did as was asked and 'regularised' the position. Seventy years on from the day Lady Lethbridge sold the field, the efforts of many people and the stewardship of Halsall Parish Council has retained for the village an asset worth supporting and enjoying.

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Gardener's Corner

March at-a-glance

Remember the old rhyme about March winds & April showers? – Adding, a sharp frost can still catch you out but, the sun often shines this month and when it does you can almost see the new gardening season gathering steam daily. Happy Gardening.

General Garden Tasks

Spring clean the garden – fork over the soil in borders, weed & mulch, & dig up & divide overcrowded perennials.

Remove weeds & moss on paths & drives.

Deal with worm casts & molehills.

Make the first lawn cut if dry enough.

Redefine lawn edges.

Lay turf before the end of the month if not done in autumn.

Plant pot-grown shrubs, roses & climbers.

Prune modern bush roses, vigorous climbing roses, dogwoods & willows.

Tidy up patio roses, ground cover roses & shrub roses.

Moves deciduous trees & shrubs & plant new bare-root plants.

Renovate overgrown climbers.

Tidy up rock garden, alpine screes & sink gardens.

Sow wildflowers & hardy annuals.

Divide snowdrops 'in the green'.

Scrub or pressure-wash patio slabs.

Prepare soil, then sow lettuce, rocket, radishes, spring onions, leeks, broad beans & peas.

Plant onion sets & shallots.

Plant early potatoes grown in pots undercover; plant outdoors at the end of the month.

Sow hardy herbs & plant & divide perennial herbs.

Plant rhubarb, pot-grown fruit trees & bushes & strawberry plants.

Prune standard apple & pear trees before the buds burst into growth.

Hand-pollinate peaches, nectarines & apricots & protect early blossom with fleece.

Sow tomatoes, chillies, sweet-peppers, aubergines & half-hardy annuals under glass.

Watch out for

Slugs, snails, woodlice & greenfly under glass.

Mice in sheds & greenhouses.

On cold nights cover vulnerable plants with fleece.

Daffodils. Crocus. Lily-of-the-valley. Tulips. Magnolia stellata. Chaenomeles. Forsythia. Camellias. Amelancheir Lamarckian. Aubrietia. Primula. Wallflowers. Cornus. Azara. Spiraea. Skimmia japonica. Viburnum tinus. Jasmine. Scilla. Garrya. Clematis `Freckles`. Malus. Scilla
