

The Second Mountain -The quest for a moral life.

In our Diocesan Rule of Life, we are encouraged by Bishop Paul to Pray Read and Learn. Recently I have finished reading a fascinating book "The second mountain, the quest for a moral life" by David Brooks. Through the metaphor of climbing two successive mountains, the author describes some of the struggles and false idols that people face in modern society. Climbing the first mountain in search of personal happiness is contrasted with that the more noble climb of the second mountain (a moral life). Whilst not explicitly Christian the book is rooted in Judeo-Christian tradition and certainly provides some food for thought on our life long journey of Christian discipleship.

Individualism is the belief system that champions individuality and is the dominant ethos of Western society. Individualism teaches us to 'find our own paths' and in rejecting the pressures of how we should behave or the 'social norms of behaviour' it offers freedom of choice. It teaches us that we don't have to conform to the ideas, values or behaviours of other people or organisations (including religions). What's not so obvious is that that freedom also comes at a price. Individualism can leave people feeling adrift, and directionless. Many young people facing daunting questions about what to do with their lives feel desperate to find something to which they can anchor themselves and find direction. That 'something' often ends up being the false idol of material gain. Buy this car or dress or house and you'll feel great the People can find themselves on the career ladder where adverts tell us. companies rather than value systems provide a sense of structure and purpose. This way of life rewards hard work with material success, but the pursuit of material success eventually leads to the same problem. Either you make it to the top of the ladder and are left with the classic midlife crisis of the same original question "now what?" or you don't which is equally as bad.

There's a general desire that underlies most of the goals of a life of individualism. Happiness. Do what you want in order to make yourself happy. But, as an ultimate goal of life, happiness the author suggests might be a flawed objective. The problem lies at the heart of happiness itself. Basically, when you feel happy, it's because you've achieved one of your goals (promotion, bonus, degree). Happiness ensues, but not for long, because the glow of achievement and fulfilment soon fades away. Happiness is a temporary state. The problem with happiness isn't just that it's fleeting.

A moral life on the other hand has the potential for longer lasting Joy. Think of the fulfilment of providing vital aid to thousands of poor people in India, like Mother Teresa did. There's a smallness to a life lived in the pursuit of happiness, while there's a grandness to one lived in service to others. That's what the second mountain is all about. Instead of self-centred material success and happiness, a life of service leads to longer lasting satisfaction and joy.

The Joy that comes from, focusing on others, finding delight in them, giving your time and energy to them, and making their lives better in the process of doing so leads to a deeper, more permanent sense of fulfilment. We all feel uplifted by seeing other people joyful too. A life of lasting joy is a life of service – and a life of service is a life of overflowing love. Sound familiar? A noble purpose and the love and service of others?

And there's a lot to do. From poverty and homelessness to drug addiction and chronic loneliness, there are plenty of problems to be solved in the world around us and maintaining deep, healthy and loving relationships with our friends, family or partners, also requires self-giving love.

The difficult and struggle of the second mountain is that it means exposing yourself to other people's suffering. Making yourself sensitive to other people's feelings also makes us vulnerable. Inevitably that leads to moments when our feelings of love of our neighbour flicker and fade. If we are to continue our commitment to the service of other people in these low tough moments it is habit and rituals, which can ensure that you continue to treat people in a loving manner even when we ourselves struggle. For many people, church is the most important area of life that teaches this model of behaviour. Church calls us to a life of commitment and service. The church's rituals help us to develop habits of thought and behaviour which re-kindle love of our neighbour and help us care for ourselves. Also through the day-to-day experiences of life in a faith-based community there is a joy that comes from communal life that is filled with love and based on a shared belief in God. This kind of community-building provides a path to living a life of service. Community continually needs rebuilding. Our communities lie in the hands of all those people who have committed themselves to a community-centred life of service weaving the strands of the community together. Once we start seeing our community in this way and begin looking for opportunities to bring it together, all sorts of potential projects and causes start calling out. There's no shortage of ideas. All that's missing is people like us to make them realities!

This year's Harvest Appeal in our United Benefice will be Micah, Liverpool.

Micah is a charity formed by Liverpool's two Cathedrals and St Bride's Church. It aims to relieve food poverty and food insecurity by providing emergency food pantries (foodbanks) and community markets.

Last year Micah Foodbank gave out 12,500 emergency food parcels from two Liverpool church sites. About 1 in 5 food parcels were for children. David Walker, one of our Readers, volunteers with Micah for a day each week and finds it immensely enjoyable and rewarding. He will be happy to answer any questions.

We are asked to make donations of non-perishable food and toiletries from the list of essentials provided. A suitable container will be available in each church during the month of September until out Harvest Festivals in October.

If necessary, it will be emptied from time to time during this period. In addition, most of the fresh produce given for our Harvest Festivals will be donated to Micah's Food Pantries and Community Markets.



TO ALL RESIDENTS OF HALSALL RE FRACKING AT ALTCAR MOSS

This is to advise you that Halsall Parish Council will be objecting to planning application LCC/2019/0037 (proposed fracking at Altcar Moss Wellsite, Suttons Lane, Great Altcar, Lancashire.)

We urge all residents to object in their own name to devcon@lancashire.gov.uk by 13th November 2019, two weeks before the Devon Committee Meeting on 27th November.

If you choose to submit an objection in your own name, please put OBJECTION on it clearly otherwise some people have said that it will only be treated as comments and possibly disregarded.

The Devcon meeting is currently advertised as 27th November 2019 but this can change.

Overleaf please find a summary of the background to possible objections for you to consider should you wish to do so:

SUMMARY OF OBJECTIONS

GENERAL OBJECTIONS

Need for shale gas

Most of the UK's gas comes from offshore, mainly from the North Sea, where new finds are being developed; while onshore fracking will require thousands of well pads and tens of thousands of wells across the countryside.

2. Climate Change impact

Shale fracking wells leak methane into the atmosphere, which together with combustion of the gas is as harmful to climate change as coal fired power stations. There is huge potential for far more renewable energy, particularly wave and tidal.

Harvesting the gas

Due to its geology, harvesting shale gas in the UK is unlikely to be as cheap as the USA and Australia; and it will present far more environmental threats. UK regulatory controls simply aim to minimise the risks and are untested and suspected to prove ineffective.

4. Water wastage and contamination

Fracking wells require large quantities of clean water, all of which is wasted. The 40% flowback absorbs toxic chemical elements in the shale and needs specialist treatment before disposal. The 60% remaining underground has the potential to contaminate groundwater which provides nearly a third of UK drinking supplies.

5. Public Health

Residents near fracking wells face disruption, damage and potential danger to their property, health, and livelihoods. Health risks include impairment of air quality, sleep disturbance, and mental health issues; and baseline environmental monitoring prior to fracking is essential but likely to be neglected.

Community compensation

The community compensation arrangements are restricted to residents living closest to well pads and are only payable if fracking takes place. Acceptance of the payments could invalidate any future claim for compensation in the event of damage to property or health.

SITE OBJECTIONS

7. Site development

The proposed well pad at Great Altcar may initially house only 2 wells but may be doubled in size in due course, and it has the potential to reach under half the properties in Formby. Aurora's licence obligations and plans are likely to lead to further well pads right across the Moss.

8. Local geology

The potential pathways and conduits for fugitive emissions of gas and fluids are the numerous fault lines under the site, the nearby disused oil boreholes, and the inevitable corrosion of the steel well shafts and their concrete casing over time.

9. Ecology

The well pad is located within a number of protection and conservation areas, and houses nesting sites for threatened native birds. It is also on the flight path for over wintering geese and swans, which forage on the surrounding farm lands.

10. Traffic

The main access route to the well pad will be along the Formby by pass, turning onto the B5195 which runs between a busy supermarket and an extensive retail park and a narrow bridge over the River Alt. The heavy vehicles serving the fracking site may contain toxic loads, and back up and congest a main route to Ormskirk Hospital and the Children's A&E Department for the area.

11. Lack of emergency plans

Local councils and emergency services have not yet developed plans to deal with the risks posed by fracking well operation at Great Altcar and are ill equipped to do so. The threats include the potential contamination of air by gas discharge and possible explosion, necessitating public evacuation.

12. Hydrogeology

Nearly half of Aurora's PEDL 164 licence area is covered by groundwater protection orders, as the water provides domestic supplies and irrigation of farmland. The orders require monitoring of both groundwater levels and quality, yet the nearest boreholes are about 5km away from the proposed well pad at Great Altcar.

13. Flood defence

The area surrounding the proposed well pad is potentially at risk from flooding from rivers or the sea, and is reliant on field drains, flood gates and dredging. Funding cuts in local flood defence are a source of concern, and overflowing could flood the well pad and potentially spread toxic chemicals.

14. Landscape and visual impact

The isolated village of Great Altcar is a designated Conservation Area, and development rights are restricted. Night time working on the well pad with associated noise, vibration and lighting is alien to the local landscape.

15. Local economy

Any extra jobs created by fracking are likely to prove temporary or menial and need to be set against possible job losses in local agriculture, service industries and tourism. Local agricultural produce may prove difficult to sell if it is thought to be contaminated by fracking activity.

16. Aurora's viability

Aurora's substantial operating losses to date have largely been covered by tax haven funding. There is little evidence that the company has the viability to conclude its licence conditions or compensate residents in the event of damage to the local environment.



Gardener's Corner

October at-a-glance

One big benefit of autumn is that it is the start of a brand new season with a pattern all of its own. We have the rich tapestry of autumn colours and late flowers to look forward to - low orange colour of an Indian summer and refreshing evenings with a nip in the air. Happy gardening.

General garden tasks.

Tidy borders lightly, clear weeds & cut down flower stems.

Compost all green rubbish

Make a new lawn by laying turf

Reduce mowing

Carry out autumn lawn care

Plant container grown trees & shrubs, climbers & roses

Plant bare-root plants at the end of the month, providing the ground is ready

Check tree ties in windy weather

Prune late flowering climbing roses & repeat –flowering old-fashioned roses

Take hardwood cuttings of roses towards the end of the month

Pot up cuttings taken in the summer

Trim privet hedges

Remove fallen leaves from the crowns of plants to prevent rotting

Lift tender perennials & bulbs

Once the veg patch is cleared, carry out winter digging

Cut down asparagus foliage

Plant spring cabbage & over wintering onion sets

Plant garlic towards the end of the month or next month

Pot up herbs for winter use

Pick apples & pears for storing mid-month

Prepare for new fruit trees & plant if conditions allow

Have a good clear out of the greenhouse & prepare for the cold weather

Reduce the amount of water given to greenhouse plants as the nights get colder

Have a pond clear out: cut down any dead & decaying leaves.

Watch out for

First frosts

Plants in their prime

Japanese maples. Acers. Euonymus. Prycanthea. Malus. Colchicum. Nerine. Amaryllis. Perovskia. Chanomeles. Viburnum. Clematis varieties. Asters. Chrysanthemums. Kniphofia. Lavatera. Liriope. Penstemon. Sedum. Solidago. Tricytis. Cosmos. Nicotiana. Salvia. Winter flowering pansies. Persicaria. Heleniums. Rudbeckias.
