#### The Reader Writes

November, for me, is dominated by the theme of Remembrance. Remembrance Sunday – where we take time to reflect upon the price of freedom and the price of war – is the focus of the month.

I'm not a big fan of war films but recently I did go to see *Churchill* and *Dunkirk*. I enjoyed both films, though *Dunkirk* was very difficult viewing at times.

Like most people of my generation, I was aware that the events depicted in the film were of great importance in the development of the Second World War, but the film really brought home the grim reality of it! And I hadn't grasped that, had the plan failed, the War would have been over then and the Allies would have had to surrender to Hitler.

The history books record that 338,000 allied troops were evacuated by a flotilla of boats and ships of MANY shapes and sizes. What is less known is the central role of prayer in those events. King George VI called the nation to a day of prayer on 26<sup>th</sup> May 1940. He realised that the battle wasn't just about flesh and blood. There were those who were fighting and those who had vessels that could come to assist the rescue but, for MOST people, they couldn't fight, they didn't have a sailing vessel, but they could pray.

There were QUEUES out of churches and cathedrals that day! When God's people cried out in prayer, apparent miracles happened. That's what Winston Churchill called it: The MIRACLE OF DUNKIRK – because for 3 days Hitler inexplicably diverted many of his forces away from Dunkirk. Had he not done that, it would have been certain defeat for us. Additionally, bad weather stopped the Luftwaffe being able to fly on the Tuesday, letting the allied troops amass on the beaches in relative safety. But the next day the weather lifted, providing I deal sailing conditions for all the vessels to cross the Channel.

The King was so convinced that God had answered prayer that he declared Sun 9<sup>th</sup> June a National Day of Thanksgiving.

Things have rather changed in the intervening decades; can you imagine our government in a time of crisis (rather than just turn to focus groups and special advisors) also calling us to our knees in prayer?


Now, you might argue that we haven't needed national prayer since. But as I write this, President Trump and Kim Jong Un, the North Korea President, seem intent on starting World War 3; Spain is having problems with Catalonia's bid for independence — resulting in demonstrations and violent clashes between the police and protestors; in Myanmar, the persecution of Rohingya Muslims has put the United Nations on full alert for another mass exodus; and the future of the UK's relationship with the rest of Europe remains uncertain.

So, it seems like a good time to turn to God in prayer for our nation and for world events.

Why not start with world events and world leaders? What have we got to lose?

#### Church Finances - Some myths "Busted"

In discussions with neighbours, parishioners and regular members of the St Cuthbert's congregation it is clear that confusion reigns when it comes to considering how the Church finances work. Our Church is no different to any other and all at the moment are facing similar financial challenges. So this article will hopefully clarify exactly how the Church is financed and more importantly where that support comes from. Firstly lets deal with the myths:-

#### St Cuthbert's Church

- receives no government funding,
- receives no funding from the Church of England,
- receives no funding from the Church Commissioners,
- owns no land or buildings,
- does not own the old vicarage in Halsall village.

However, St Cuthbert's Church is:-

- wholly responsible for paying the costs of heating, lighting, insurance, consumables etc.
- wholly responsible for paying maintenance costs for our Church which is a Grade 1 listed building and therefore subject to rigid controls and restrictions,
- has to pay a monthly contribution to the Diocese of Liverpool which is to cover the cost of Vicars salaries, parish housing, vicars pension contributions as well as retired Vicars pensions,
- does receive fees for weddings and funerals but from these must meet the cost of statutory charges payable to the Church of England as well as paying the Organists, vergers etc

We are very aware that over the last few years we have been asking our local community for additional financial support. In particular we have been focussed on the urgent need that arose when we discovered significant problems with the spire and vestry roof. With the help of individuals and groups within our community, the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Headley Trust we were able to meet a significant proportion of the costs of the necessary work and the remaining costs had to be met from using all of our reserves.

As we reported at the time there was no choice to be made. If we did not do the work the church would suffer more significant damage and would ultimately not have been able to remain open. Without our contribution to the costs we would not have been eligible for the significant HLF grant and the scheme would have been impossible.

So, the work is done and we are extremely thankful for that. However, we have used up all of our financial reserves and our annual financial position is:-

- It costs us £62,000 a year to keep St Cuthbert's open, that is £170 every day,
- On average over the last three years the Church has had a £10,000 per year shortfall in its running costs, this is a significant sum,
- We do not now have reserves to meet that gap.

#### So where do we go from here....

We are constantly trying to identify how we can reduce our costs and have been able to reduce our insurance costs and gardening costs (by not carrying out paid Churchyard maintenance in the winter months) Our costs are kept down by volunteers doing regular maintenance around the church for which we are very grateful.

We would not survive without those 80 people who are able to give on a monthly or weekly basis and no matter how large or small every donation matters.

It is however a sad reality that churches generally are struggling. Congregations are dwindling and ours is no different. We would love to be able to open the church up more for community activities and for more people of all faiths or none to feel welcomed through our doors but at the moment our challenge is to raise enough funds to meet our current running costs.

St Cuthbert's Church is much loved and belongs to the whole community. We hear many people referring to it as 'our' Church and if it is to remain so then we have no choice but to seek more recurring financial support from 'our' community. Even giving as little as £5 a month would contribute to the problems that we face.

We are very well aware that times are challenging and we would expect that our individual priorities must always be in caring for our families first. However we can only ask that you consider if there is any way you can support the Church.

#### Standards and Attainment

As you may well be aware, the school performed brilliantly in the National Tests last year and our results were some of the best in Lancashire.

Halsall Primary was in the top 10% of schools across the whole country for Progress and Attainment in Reading and Progress and Attainment in Mathematics.

The school's score for pupils achieving the Expected Level in all 3 components (Reading, Mathematics and Writing) was 82%, significantly above the National Average of 61%.

#### **Book Week**

As part of our Book Week, when we tried to promote the importance of reading and the joy of reading, we held a special Dress-Up day. Children and staff came to school as their favourite Mr Men character. There were so many amazing outfits and everyone had a wonderful day.

This culminated in a parade around the school hall where family and friends were holding a coffee afternoon in aid of McMillan Cancer Support. The fund-raising event was a spectacular success and lots of people came along and donated. And the children looked amazing in their Mr Men creations.

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#### **Edmund Heathcote Orritt WW1**



Edmund Heathcote Orritt was born in Lathom in 1896. His early life was spent on Delph farm where after a rudimentary education he followed the family tradition into farming. At the age of 18 the first great conflict broke out in Europe and being of age Edmund signed up and from the outset he enrolled in the King's Liverpool Regiment 9<sup>th</sup> battalion. As a key land worker he could have been exempted but this was not for Edmund, a medium sized lad about 5 feet 5 inches with dark brown hair he had a zeal to do something exciting in his life.

Edmund began basic training in the south of England at Tunbridge Wells in October 1914. It was March before he landed in France and he probably saw action at the Battle of Aubers Ridge in May when as part of a third wave the Battalion achieved little with over 100 killed. He was next engaged in the Battle of Loos one of the major battles of 1915. He served gallantly coming under heavy artillery fire. He had earned some welcome leave and spent a few weeks in August 1916 at home, helping with the harvest, a respite and calm before returning to his regiment on the 25th August and became embroiled in the month of the campaign known as the Somme. The battle of Flers-Coucelette was the third British offensive during the Battle of the Somme and was the first engagement to use tanks and it is not unlikely that Edmund was one of the first soldiers to witness these machines in action. The push in September saw the battalion achieving nearly all their objectives but 147 men lost their lives and there were many wounded. During the engagement on the 25<sup>th</sup> September in Delville wood Longueval near Combles, Edmund was struck by a piece of shrapnel in the head causing considerable injury and necessitated an operation resulting in fragments of bone being removed from his head which also caused some loss of sight. He was sent back to England on the 6<sup>th</sup> October 1916. This injury rendered him incapacitated for the rest of

his life and the army estimated that he would only ever have 50 per cent capacity for work. On the recommendation of Captain Wells he was discharged on the 26<sup>th</sup>December 1916. He was awarded the British War Medal, the 1914/15 Medal and the Victory Medal.

Edmund married Margaret Rimmer Bond from Altcar and moved to Moor Farm Haskayne in 1925 where he farmed until his death in 1974 passing on the farm to his only son also called Edmund.

**2017/0891/FUL** - 14A New Cut Lane - Variation of Condition No. 10 Imposed on planning permission 2014/0301/FUL to read: 'The surface water drainage scheme shall be implemented in accordance with Hamilton Tech. Services drainage report ref. 'C-0703 Issue 1, 10/06/16', and restricted to existing run-off rates. The development shall be completed, maintained and managed in accordance with the approved details'. Removal of Condition No. 15 imposed on planning permission 2014/0301/FUL relating to the prior acquisition of a licence from Natural England – WLBC advised that Halsall Parish Council is against any variation of condition No.10.

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#### Gardener's Corner

#### November at-a-glance

Once the autumn leaves have fallen, evergreen shrubs really come into their own. They give the garden year-round backbone and some are very striking, in shades of gold, reds, bronze or blues, as well as plain green or various variegated patterns, late berries, craggy tree trunks and coloured stems of trees and shrubs – who said winter was dull! Happy gardening.

#### General garden tasks

Carry out winter digging of forking over.

Check over the garden for anything that's likely to be at risk from frost Continue cutting the grass if conditions allow, but raise the blades..

Collect up dead leaves from the lawn & make leaf mould & potting compost

Lay turf if you didn't last month

Plant & move bare-root trees & shrubs

Stake well any newly planted trees

Plant tulips this month

Dig up dahlia tubers once the plants start to die off after the first frosts

Protect container plants from the cold, wet & windy weather

Continue harvesting leeks & Brussels sprouts.

Plant fruit trees

Ventilate the greenhouse on warm days but reduce watering

Check stored fruit & vegetables

Grow windowsill & salad herbs

Do your autumn pond clear-out if you didn't get round to it last month Clean pool filters & check cables for pumps & lights

#### Watch out for

Snails in crevices around the garden

Mice in sheds & greenhouses especially where there is stored fruit

Pigeons pinching your winter greens

Squirrels & mice digging up your bulbs

Windy weather disturbing tree stakes chaffing the bark.

#### Get ahead

Think about any garden designing & alterations you`d like to do over the winter months

Give the lawn mower a maintenance check now or over the winter

Start winter pruning

Mulch fruit trees

#### Plants in their prime

Viburnum. Ornamental cabbages. Winter flowering pansies & Violas. Potted topiary. Gaultheria. Skimmia. Clematis `freckles`. Mahonia. Euonymus. Pyracantha. Winter jasmine. Asters. Liriope muscari. Schizostylis. Stipa. Cyclamen. Persicaria.

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
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
