

My dear Friends,

This month we publish the accounts for 1965 and other matters must, in consequence, be brief. In this short letter I want to say once again how much I appreciate all the efforts made on behalf of the various aspects of our work together last year. The results show the sacrifices made and the hours spent, and I express the hope that you will all work together again this year to see us completely clear of our commitments.

Two points need emphasising when we consider the ordinary expenses of our church. The first is the sad fact of the ever rising cost of everything. In order to meet these it is important that we all try to increase our weekly gift by a small amount. An increase of 5% (one shilling in every £1) will keep the general account on an even keel. Let us all make the effort to do this in 1966. One easy example of the kind of increase we refer to is the cost of this magazine which will be ten shillings per week more in 1966.

The second point I want to mention is the wonderful help we receive from covenanted subscriptions. You will notice from the balance sheet that we received back from H.M. Inspector of Taxes the sum of £471.19.7d, which is a tremendous help. I do ask you to consider your own gifts and if you are paying income tax at the standard rate of 8/3d, please think seriously about the covenant scheme. I have written a fuller explanation under a separate heading. Can we have more covenants in 1966? It is well worth while.

Finally a word about Lent. Let us make a good Lent together. Instead of the Film Services we shall have a short Devotional Service with address each THURSDAY EVENING in Lent (except 24th February and March 17th). It is important that we make our Communion regularly. Which of the services of Holy Communion will you attend regularly in Lent? A full list of all the services will be found in this magazine.

I look forward to seeing you all in your places in church regularly during Lent. Can you persuade one of your neighbours to come with you? Never forget that the most important side of all our work together is our WORSHIP OF GOD.

COVENANT SCHEME

The income of Churches, hospitals and many other charitable organisations has long been exempt from Income Tax. Consequently if you make a contribution to the Church from your normal taxed income, the Tax you have already paid on it can be recovered by your Church.

There are a few simple rules to be followed, these

make the Scheme very easy to operate.

You have to sign a deed of covenant, promising to give a fixed annual sum to the Church for a period of not less than 7 years. A covenant is automatically cancelled by death.

If you are paying income tax at the standard rate (at present 8/3d, in the £1) your Church can recover 14/1d, tax on every £1 you subscribe. For instance, if

you covenant an annual amount of £15, the Church will receive £15 plus £9.10.0 tax refund, a total of £24.10.0. This means that you must be paying tax at the standard rate on at least £24.10.0 total income and of course you must be paying tax at the full rate to cover your covenant in this way, for each of the seven years you covenant for.

Weekly gifts can be covenanted in the same way. Just enter the total you promise for the year on the covenant form, and remember the promise must be

for 7 years.

When your deed of covenant is completed it will be stamped and submitted to the Inland Revenue Authorities.

Each year you will be asked to sign a simple certificate (R185) to say that your payment is from your taxed income and this will enable the Church to re-claim the tax.
